

#### INTRODUCTION

The COPLAC Data Profile for the 2005-06 Academic Year is comprised of six separate sections, each of which is five pages in length. The last column (in *italics*) on the fifth page of each section (e.g., Sec. I, p. 5; Sec. II, p. 10; Sec. III, p. 15; etc.) presents averages for all the Data Element indicators covered in that section. In order to ensure that these values were meaningful and representative, each average was calculated only if at least 16 of the 24 COPLAC institutions had provided data for any particular indicator.

The compilation of this report could not have been accomplished without the excellent cooperation of the various research coordinators employed at COPLAC colleges and universities, each of whom provided data for her/his respective institution. It is our common hope that the information contained in this report will prove useful to all COPLAC member institutions.
